R. J. Zwi Werblowsky is Martin Buber Professor of Comparative Religion; Chairman Departments of Comparative Religion and of Jewish Thought.

Born 1924, Bachelor of Arts London, Dr-es-letters Geneve 1951, taught at University of Leeds and the Institute of Jewish Studies in Manchester, was Visiting Professor at Kokugakuin University, Tokyo, Brown University, Rhode Island (U.S.A.) University of Chicago, University of Notre Dame, University of Melbourne, Harvard University, Stanford University.

Secretary General of the International Association for the History of Religions, Chairman The Israel Interfaith Committee, Editor of several scholarly journals. Yosef Yerushalmi is Salo Wittmayer Baron Professor of Jewish History, Culture and Society and director of the Center for Israel and Jewish Studies at Columbia University. Born in New York City, he received his Ph.D. from Salo Baron at Columbia in 1966; taught at Havard University, as Jacob E. Safra Professor of Jewish History and Sephardic Civilization was Chairman of its department of Near Eastern Languages and Civilizations. Specializes in the history of Spanish and Portuguese Jewry both before and after the Expulsion. Has done extensive research in the archives of the Inquisition in Portugal, Spain and Italy.

Author of: FROM SPANISH COURT TO ITALIAN GHET-TO, HAGGADAH AND HISTORY, THE LISBON MASSA-CRE OF 1506. Fellow of the American Academy for Jewish Research and Fellow of the National Endowment for the Humanities. Was awarded the Newman Medal for Distinguished Achievement by the City University of New York. 1:45

Publications in various scientific journals on Sephardic Judaism in Western Europe. Has done extensive research in the archives of the Portuguese Jewish congregation of Amsterdam and has delivered various lectures in this field. Daniel Swetschinsky is Assistant Professor of Jewish History in the Department of Oriental Studies at the University of Arizona, Tucson. Born in Brussels, Belgium he grew up in Amsterdam, Holland. He received his education in Semitic languages and Judaic studies at the Universities of Ghent, Amsterdam and Brandeis.

Has done extensive research in the archives and libraries of Israel, Spain, Portugal, Belgium and Holland. Served as lecturer in Jewish history at Mc Gill University, Montreal. He is presently working on Hugo de Groot's Jewry law and toleration, on the religious writings of Menasseh ben Israel, on Hugenot-Jewish relations in seventeenth century Holland an on a study of the Portuguese Inquisition. His chief interest lies in the social and economic history of modern Sephardic Jewry.

Prof. Dr. Alfred Gottschalk is President of the Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute of Religion.

He was born in Germany, obtained his Bachelor of Arts at Brooklyn College, received his Ph. D. from the University of South California, his D. Lt. from Dropsie College and his LL. D. from University of Cincinatti.

Taught at University of California and Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute of Religion.
