

### THE CHRISTOPHER COLUMBUS FOUNDATION

The Christopher Columbus Foundation, a private organization of prominent citizens of the American Nations, has been formed to commemorate a dramatic moment in the history of the Americas, and to develop the Island of San Salvador as a cultural center for the Hemisphere. As the point of origin for the peoples who, over many generations, settled the New World, it is hoped that one day San Salvador will become a repository of the arts and artifacts of the Age of Discovery as well as a showplace for exhibits by all the nations which benefited from that discovery.

The Foundation has declared as its aims:

The promotion of peace, education, and friendship among the peoples of the Americas and of the world.

An "Instituto de La Americas" at San Salvador would be established and eventually, a seat of high learning dedicated to such activities that will contribute to the knowledge of American governmental and business relations, history, geography, languages, literature and the arts.

The organization plans a new museum, music festivals, and competitions designed to encourage peoples of the Americas to exchange ideas in the arts.

The Foundation believes that in the encouragement of scholarship, the exchange of students, sharing of knowledge, and fostering of interpersonal relationships between men of disparate nations lies the key to a peaceful and prosperous future for this hemisphere. The primary purpose for the formation of the Foundation is to facilitate the formation of such relationships among the future leaders of our hemisphere.

In the practical world of economics, the Foundation plans to invite men of distinction from the business life of all the nations of the hemisphere to meet in convocations to discuss the problems and needs of their respective countries. Seminars for students of Western Hemisphere and general international economics would benefit from the experience and thinking of the foremost men of our era.

The laying of the cornerstone for the "Instituto de Las Americas" represents the first action in the construction of this center for the "New World," and is to symbolize the faith of the founders in the creations to come.

It is indeed fitting that this enterprise, dedicated to discovering new grounds for a meeting of the minds of men, be named for that giant personality whose discovery four hundred and seventy-three years ago, gave us all the gift of nationhood, the gift of mutual and cherished homelands — Christopher Columbus. This Foundation hopes by its efforts to contribute sufficient works and deeds to make it worthy of the illustrious name it has adopted.

### THE ISLAND OF SAN SALVADOR



Less than one degree of latitude above the Tropic of Cancer, fronting the broad swells of the Atlantic, only a little changed from that fateful day in 1492, lies the all-but-forgotten island of San Salvador. Known by the Indians as "Guanahani," and later as "Watling's Island," the name "San Salvador" was bestowed on the place by Christopher Columbus.

To name the island after the Saviour was not solely an act of symbolism by Columbus; it was also a realistic acknowledgement. For the finding of that place, at that time, on that morning was the salvation of the expedition, the fleet, and perhaps the life of Columbus himself.

Thirty-five days out from the Canaries, sailing ever westward into the unknown, having endured hardships, two false landfalls, two near mutinies, perilously close to the end of his tether, the sight of the low beach illumined by the moon must indeed have seemed a gift of divine providence to the voyager.

On that October morning history forever changed the little island in the warm sun. Christopher Columbus had not, as he thought, come upon the Indies by a new, short route. He had discovered a New World.

For many years people argued about which island was Columbus' San Salvador. When most historians agreed, the island which had been named Watling's, for a noted buccaneer, was re-named San Salvador. It is about 200 miles east southeast of Nassau.

The oldest monument to the discovery is a weathered stone cairn erected on the San Salvador beach by The Chicago Herald in 1891 in anticipation of the 400th anniversary of the 1492 discovery. Another marker, a cement cross, is located on what is now called Landing Beach, south of Cockburn Town, the main settlement on San Salvador. This is the spot where our celebration will take place. Another monument marks the spot where Columbus and his crew attended the first mass celebrated in America.


In 1962 an almost exact replica of Columbus' smallest ship, the Nina, was built in Spain. It sailed from Palos, his Spanish point of departure, along the original westerly route.

The 20th century replica of the caravel reached San Salvador on Christmas Eve 1962 and anchored off Cockburn Town. Nina was subsequently towed to Nassau and placed on exhibition for a while before being taken to Mexico.

The island is low, sparsely wooded, with a few rolling hills inland, many beautiful lakes, and miles of clean, smooth beaches. Points of interest are Cockburn Town, "Watling's Castle" — ruins of the noted pirate's mansion — the discovery monuments, and a Columbus Museum.


At present there are about 1,000 inhabitants living on the beautiful island. Many of these are descendents of Royalists and their slaves who fled from Virginia during the American Revolutionary War.

It is now assured that San Salvador, which has had a fairly quiet existence since 1492, will claim its inheritance and become a meeting place for the cultures of the Old and New Worlds, as history intended.
